Prevent Duty



Remember the words:



is a far better option than to surrender or negotiate. If there's nowhere to go then...

HIDE It's better to hide than to confront. Remember to turn your phone to silent and turn off vibrate. Barricade vourself in if you can. Then finally and only when it is safe to do so...

TELL Tell the police by calling 999.

Information is vital. If you see or hear something that could be terrorist related, trust your instincts and call the Anti-terrorist hotline on 0800 789321. Your call could save lives.

Lifelong Learning is working with Refugee Action, DWP, Wirral Strategic Housing and Investment and Wirral Change to support the refugees. Our ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) classes enable families and individuals to learn the language, integrate successfully into British life and provide future opportunities for volunteering and work.

Hygiene

Handwashing

It is important that you wash your hands regularly and thoroughly. Soap and warm water will be available in all our venues, and hand sanitiser will also be available for you to use in the classrooms.

Cleaning guidelines

The tutors and building cleaning staff will clean and disinfect surfaces and common touch points before and after each class and throughout the day.

Catch it, Kill it, Bin it

Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in a bin and wash your hands.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

Travelling to Classes

Public transport

- You must wear a face covering on all public transport.
- Be aware of surfaces you touch and be careful not to touch your face.
- Maintain social distancing (where possible) including at busy entrances, exits, bus stops and platforms.
- Once you have completed your journey, wash your hands as soon as possible.

Sharing a vehicle

- Share with the same person or people.
- Avoid touching your face.
- Maintain good ventilation (i.e. keeping the windows open) and face away from each other during the journey.
- Before entering and after getting out of the vehicle wash your hands.
- Regularly clean your vehicle, where contact may have occurred with any surfaces such as door handles or window controls.

Using your own transport, walking, and cycling will reduce contact with other people.

Resources

- We will give you your own notebook, pencil, and pen. You must take this home each week and bring it back to each class.
- You must not share pens, pencils, or any resources with your class friends
- Where possible required forms, paperwork and resources will be available online.
- If you are attending a course where you use equipment such as sewing machines, computers etc. your tutor will ask you to wipe down the equipment at the start and end of each class. All cleaning materials will be provided.

What to do if you feel unwell

You must self-isolate at home and not attend your class if:

- You have any symptoms of coronavirus (a high temperature, a new, continuous cough or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste).
- You're waiting for a coronavirus test result.
- You've tested positive for coronavirus (this means you have coronavirus).
- You live with someone who has symptoms, is waiting for a test result or has tested positive.
- Someone in your support bubble has symptoms, is waiting for a test result or has tested positive.
- If you're told by NHS Test and Trace that you've been in contact with a person with coronavirus.

When Maria moved to the UK from Sri Lanka in 2016, she spent 1 year at home before she joined an ESOL course at

Wirral Met College. She explained, "I felt lonely and it was very stressful as I didn't understand any English. I worked as a Public Servant in Sri Lanka and was not used to being at home. My son encouraged me to study and I now feel confident and I have made new friends."

Maria discovered the EAL Volunteers course whilst attending her ESOL Level 2 class with us. After attending the course, Maria volunteered in local schools where she supported families with written and verbal translations so they could communicate effectively with their children's schools. She has continued virtually during the Covid-19 pandemic; supporting families to work closely with their schools and keep up with home-schooling throughout lockdown.

Jodie enrolled on the Intro to Sewing course to support her daughter who had an interest in sewing. However, the more she attended the course, the more she started

to enjoy learning new skills. She completed the Open Awards Level 1 & 2 in Sewing Techniques and then completed the Industrial Sewing course. The courses were challenging but she made lots of friends.

She worked in the food industry and could now consider a muchwanted career change. Her tutor told her about a job at a local company Survitec, working as an Industrial Machine Operative manufacturing PPE. When she got the news that she was successful, she couldn't believe it had happened! She is planning to attend a Functional Skills English course in September 2020.
