### Background information

The Prime Minister announced on 27 November the temporary introduction of new measures as a result of the Omicron variant and on 8th December that **Plan B**, set out in the autumn and winter plan 2021, was being enacted. As a result, these measures are reflected in this and the accompanying updated **RA 029B Contingency Plan COVID 19-Plan B v6 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2022.** This advice remains subject to change as the situation develops.

### **School Opening**

DfE guidance for schools during the coronavirus COVID 19 pandemic has been that schools are required to have a full school opening risk assessment which is regularly reviewed and updated, treating them as 'living documents', as the circumstances in your school and the public health advice changes. This includes having active arrangements in place to monitor whether the controls are effective and working as planned.


